First, I confess some personal discomfort in seeing Cursillo labeled a "Renewal Movement", although I'm sure it's done with the best intentions. It's helpful to remind ourselves and others that the purpose is not to breathe "new life" into peripheral church members or vitalize sagging parishes. It is, rather, a tool for "equipping the saints for the work of ministry" (Ephesians 4:12).

And who are these "saints"? They are people who recognize and accept that through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ their sins have been forgiven, they are "new creatures" in Christ, they have been baptized into his Body, the Church, in which they participate and are active, and who rejoice in the eternal hope of salvation through our Lord.

So what are "apostles"? They are saints who have a desire to share the gifts of God with others through their work, their living witness, and their lives. They do this individually and in concert with others. They—and we—are called to be---(dare we use the "M" word?) missionaries, not disciples only.

WHAT IS PALANCA?

Simply stated, Palanca is the "spiritual leverage" used before and during the weekend on behalf of teams and candidates consisting of intercessory prayers, sacrifice, and spiritual disciplines adopted by individual cursillistas or group reunions. The purpose of Palanca is to surround the weekend with prayer, and to ask God's grace to be active and present in candidates, as well as team.

When is Palanca done? Before and during the weekend. How is Palanca done?

Pray by name for team and candidates on a regular basis before the weekend. In cases where the candidates' names are not available, intentional prayer for the specific weekend is used.

Make an altar visit - A regular visit to the blessed sacrament for the intention of the weekend. A time of prayer, reflection, and praise for the Lord. A quiet time in church with prayer or devotion can be used.

Extra Eucharists - Attend Eucharist during the week, other than regular Sunday offering, and offer this time and communion for the Cursillo candidates and the weekend.

Fasting and Prayer - Abstain from eating certain meals or on certain days of the week, and use the time in prayer for the Cursillo weekend.

Daily Office - This consists of daily prayer and scripture following the traditions of the Book of Common Prayer.

Any regular discipline of Prayer - Prayer undertaken for the purpose of conforming the mind and heart to the will of God for this weekend.

Palanca is NOT love notes or special gifts. These signs communicate what has already been done as Palanca. On many weekends, individual notes to candidates or team may be written, giving witness to the prayers and sacrifice undertaken on their behalf. Other forms may be banners or posters. The important thing is not the vehicle for telling the team and candidate how much we care, but the specific Palanca DONE lovingly on their behalf to the glory of God.

It is likely that thousands of women have excelled in the work of spiritual direction during the centuries between the desert mother Theodora and Margaret Guenther. Yet no more than a handful have

recorded their methods and guiding principles in manuals for the instruction of others.

Guenther has produced a primer for people who are attracted to the ministry of spiritual direction either as directors or as directees. Drawing on her own experience through anecdotal narratives and generalized reflections, she elucidates common problems and suggests a variety of specific responses. Its value accrues from the soundness of Guenther's homely wisdom, conveyed in a manner that is at once inspirational and practical. Alan Jones, from the foreword: "In the very best sense, hers is a book of non-direction: earthed and wise, compassionate and unsentimental, practical and contemplative."

A down-to-earth guide to prayer. In this down-to-earth book on the essentials of prayer, spiritual director and teacher Margaret Guenther answers many of the common questions of the spiritual life, including: Is there anyone to talk to about prayer? Do I have to go to church to be religious? Is it all right to pray like this? She also discusses basic matters of Christian practice, such as making a confession, going on retreat, using a journal to pray, finding a spiritual director, and praying when God does not seem to listen.

A reader from Brooklyn, NY, March 21, 1999:

A book about prayer for real people! This book defines, describes, and demystifies the traditions of prayer--and makes them accessible to everyone. It begins with a concise history of Christian prayer and proceeds to practical applications for us late-20th century folk.

Chapters with titles like "Finding God in the Ordinary: Your Kitchen Will Teach You Everything" and "Parenting and Prayer: How Do I Pray When the Baby is Keeping Me Up?" address the challenges of integrating spirituality with the demands of daily life. The book concludes with a list of further resources and discussion questions suitable for group or individual use.

FROM THE CHAIR

Summer is almost over and our thoughts turn to the start-up of programs at church, to our children returning to school and to all of the activities in which we find ourselves and the rest of our family involved. Added to all this the Teams are forming for the fall weekends. And the National Episcopal Cursillo Seminar is being held in October at Camp Allen outside Houston.

We find ourselves rushed in the midst of our everyday lives. We can so easily lose sight of what is important. We need to stay focused on the One who sustains us. We can only do that by bringing Him into our every day life. We need to be living our FOURTH DAY.

How do we live our FOURTH DAY? We do so by maintaining our Rule of Life. What is the Rule of Life? You might ask. It can be different for everyone. It would include - Daily Personal Prayer Time, you know, that time you spend alone with God, talking to Him and more importantly, listening TO Him. It would include a daily examination of your conscience, Bible Reading and other study as well as your ACTION to bring others to Christ. It could include going to church and the Holy Eucharist, or just sitting prayerfully in His presence at church. It includes what brings you closer to our Lord Jesus Christ and what strengthens and nourishes you so that you can change your environment for Christ.

Living our FOURTH DAY also includes Group Reunion or Grouping. This is so very important. For Cursillo is not about holding weekends. It is about changing our environments for Christ. It is about Making a Friend, Being a Friend and Bringing that Friend to Christ. We hold weekends in order to bring people into Group Reunions. It is there that we are held accountable to our Rule of Life. It is there that we are loved, accepted and encouraged in our Daily Walk with Him.

So, how are you doing? In the rush, rush, rush of our daily life we need to stay connected. We need to be connected to our Lord Jesus Christ and we need to maintain our Rule of Life in order to have strength and fortitude to be

SPIRITUAL EXERCISES

The lazy, hazy days of summer are drawing to a close. Thuds and groans from a hundred football fields tell us coaches are getting serious about team training involving a lot of physical conditioning. If you are like me, your spiritual muscles may have turned to mush over the summer. How to get back in shape so we are spiritually fit to play on God's team? This week I came across a book which I think you will find helpful. The title is "A Spiritual Formation Workbook", a Renovare resource for spiritual renewal written by James Bryan Smith. Here is one set of exercises (there are three or four others as well) which involves piety, study and action.

1. Meditate on a short section of the Bible.

Keep your selection simple: for example, Psalm 1; John 1:1-18; Philippians 2:1-11. Take twenty minutes or so to read it slowly and carefully. Pause and ask questions: What does that phrase mean? What might God be telling me about Himself? About me? About others? If a particular word or phrase strikes you, spend additional time reflecting on it.

2. Memorize a verse of scripture.

Select a verse with which you are unfamiliar. These are some good ones: Galatians 2:20; Romans 5:1; John 3:16; Psalm 1:1; Ephesians 2:8. Or choose any others. Memorization is a powerful tool in allowing the word to have access to our thought life. It is easiest to memorize the verse one phrase at a time until you are able to repeat the whole verse from memory. As you go through the day repeat it to yourself often.

3. Read one of the shorter books of the Bible out loud.

Take one of Paul's letters and read it out loud to yourself. Imagine how the audience of Christians listening to it for the first time would have reacted.

4. Look for an opportunity to tell someone about your faith.

Prayer precedes these opportunities, so begin by praying that God will put you in contact with someone who needs to hear about Jesus. Ask that

you be given some means of knowing when it is the right person and the right time and when it is not. When you are asked what you are doing, or how things are going, begin speaking about how your faith is central to your life. Do *not* speak in such a way that the person feels he or she is being judged

or manipulated. Simply witness to what has happened to you and let that word go forth in honesty and simplicity.

5. Evangelize by your actions.

St. Francis reminds us, "Always preach Christ; use words when necessary. This week let your actions speak for you. As you encounter different people, pay particular attention to your actions and what they are conveying. The fruit of the Spirit (love, joy, peace, etc.) is a tremendous witness to the power of God. When people see us exercise these virtues, they will want to know what makes us "different".

Before beginning, pray for the insight to see certain areas of your life as others see them. By the end of the exercise you should be able to pick out areas of your life that speak well of Christ and others that will need some change.

FROM THE TREASURER

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As you know, the Cursillo movement is supported entirely by donations. We attempt to "break even" on the weekends, using general contributions throughout the year to pay for expenses such as the Forward, training materials, workshops, our web site, Ultreyas, our support of National Cursillo, etc.

But this spring, for some reason, not only our donations but also our responses for the weekend fell far under expectations. Even now, with most of the costs and committed payments in, **we are still more than \$3000 short.**

A fundamental principle of the Cursillo program is that NO ONE will be denied an opportunity to make Cursillo or serve on a weekend because of lack of direct financial support. However, expenses for the weekends are real; to plan effectively to cover them, we must know what to expect from each sponsor and team member.

If you are ready to sponsor someone, and willing to meet all of the obligations of sponsorship both before and after the weekend, the inability to make a donation to cover the candidate's expenses is not an obstacle. Similarly, if the Lord calls you to work a weekend but the time is not right for you to make a financial contribution, this is perfectly okay.

But we *do* need to know what to expect. *Please be assured that information about your contribution is kept strictly confidential:* no one else will know whether you contributed \$5 or \$80 or \$160 or nothing.

Here is how you can help for future weekends:

1. If you are sponsoring someone, be sure to *complete and send in the form* sent to you by the Pre-Cursillo committee after your candidate has been accepted.
2. If, after you have made a donation, your candidate is unable to attend, please let us know if you want your contribution held for a future weekend for that person. Otherwise it will be considered a current gift.
3. If a parish fund is to cover expenses for either a candidate or a team member, please *follow up with your church office* to make sure a check is actually sent.
4. If you are going to be working the weekend, be sure you *return the form* passed out at your team meeting indicating what you will be able to contribute financially.
5. If you send in a check for either a candidate or a team member *without* a form, *be sure to make a notation as to how you want the donation credited.*
6. *If you would like to contribute toward a scholarship for a special weekend, simply indicate that on your payment and it will be credited to that weekend.*

The San Diego Cursillo community is wonderful in the continual outpouring of love, time and other treasures. May God bless you all!

GROUP REUNION

“Christ is counting on you!” Does that phrase sound familiar? I hope so, because it is on the front cover of your Rule of Life card. If you are participating in a weekly Group Reunion you see it on a regular basis. You are using a powerful tool to strengthen your walk to our Lord.

Most of us that do “group” weekly look forward to this reunion as the high spot of our week. The bonding of your group is something you can treasure forever; and you know the Lord is always there with you. You can meet anywhere. Some gather at their church, others in their homes and some at restaurants. Some people have their grouping at 7:00 a.m. and some at 7:00 p.m.. It’s all God’s time.

You may find that you will feel more comfortable with a different group than you have been meeting with. That’s O.K. As long as you dedicate that time weekly with your fellow Cursillistas you will find yourself growing in Christ.

If you are not grouping, perhaps you

This is a question that many of you may be asking yourselves. You have had the wonderful experience of attending “The Weekend” and you want to share this experience with everyone you know. You are looking around and trying to identify just who should go to this next set of weekends.

FRIST OF ALL you should be in prayer asking God to show you who He wants to attend this set of weekends. Talk to God before you talk to your friends. Only He knows what is in their hearts. THEN talk to your priest about that couple. Your priest knows if they are ready for Cursillo. It might not be the right time.

The prospective Cursillista should be a baptized Christian, stable and mature, with a desire for God’s love, a longing to be set on fire with a zeal to do His work in the church and in the world. Do you

? Does this person have the potential of seeing Christ in everyone? Will

they grow from the experience or will they look at it as just a nice weekend? Remember Cursillo is not intended to be a conversion experience. It is not intended to be a time to “fix” people’s problems.

Do you have the time and finances to sponsor someone? It is a big job and you are financially responsible for paying for their weekend. Plus buying them their dinner on the way up and on the way home. So maybe you don’t want to work the same weekend that you sponsor someone.

Your job does not begin and end with seeing that they get to the weekend. You must prepare them for the weekend. Answer ALL of their questions. Every single one of them. NOTHING is a secret. This is no secret organization. There are no secret

handshakes nor are there any secret phrases or words. Make them feel comfortable. Set their minds at ease.

If you are sponsoring a couple then you need to be there for-the wife when the man~ his weekend. Do they have children who need to be looked after? That is your job. Do they need help with shopping? That's your job. When you bring them to the camp on the weekend you DO NOT and I repeat...YOU DO NOT leave them at the door and drive off leaving them to feel abandoned. You help them get settled and bring them up to the lodge and introduce them to people you know. Then you are back up there on Sunday morning for Mananitas and again for the "Closing".

And your job isn't finished with taking them home after the weekend. You are to make sure that they are in a Group Reunion. You need to be grouping yourself, so how about your own Group Reunion? If there isn't a Group Reunion that is convenient for them then start a new group with them.

It is your responsibility to make sure that your new Cursillistas get to Fourth Day and to the Grand Ultreya. They hear so much on the weekend that not everything sinks in. At Fourth Day they hear some of the talks from a new angle. They hear about Sponsorship and Action. Ultreyas are also important in our walk. Here we group, hear a witness talk about "How I am changing my environment for Christ". We hear at least one response and the clergy response.

Sponsorship is a huge but very rewarding task. It must be taken prayerfully and lovingly. And now you want to know where to find the Sponsor forms. They are on our Cursillo Website at: sdcursillo.org; or from your Parish Rep, and in this issue of the Forward. Happy Sponsoring!

THEREFORE LET US KEEP THE FEAST

Not long ago someone said to me, "It's interesting that in the Eucharist we say 'Let us keep the peace'". Well, of course, Christians are expected to keep the peace. But what we actually say, quoting 1 Cor. 5:8, is "Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us, therefore let us keep the feast".

According to the Gospel, the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a feast, to a party, to a never-ending treat, to a festival--and, according to Jesus, that kingdom is already here on earth. That was essentially the message the disciples were sent to preach: first repent, then come to God's table and feast.

We should repent our sins and turn to God our Father, for if we do not change things will get worse and finally collapse or explode. That's the first part of the message.

The second part is: we are invited to a feast. We are created and saved to celebrate our human life here on earth and in all time to come. Our Lord Jesus came to invite us to a celebration of the gift we got from our Father in heaven: our human life, to be lived in His image. We should celebrate that life, enjoy it--bodily, spiritually.

What, then, of sin? Sin is sin, because it hinders and blocks that celebration. That's why murder, envy, hatred, theft, injustice, exploitation, loose human and sexual relations, corruption, and neglecting and abandoning our children and our parents are all sin.

We do need to be converted, but not with the nagging idea in our head that after our conversion life should be dull, monochrome and monotone. After we have given ourselves, our souls and bodies, to God in gratitude, life should start to be a feast! Jesus said, "I came to bring you life---abundant life". In essence, he keeps saying, "Take it from me and really enjoy it. The more you enjoy it, and share it with others, the surer I am of your thankfulness".

This Easter we will gather to celebrate the victory of Christ over death, to help our children and grandchildren share our faith that Jesus is alive, and to declare that Jesus Christ is Lord indeed. Christ our Passover is sacrificed and risen for us; therefore let us keep The Feast!

PALANCA

Each one of us received many prayers and items in a bag or on our bed when we made our weekend. Many of us were overwhelmed that so many people took time out of their busy schedules to pray for us, to remember us, to write to us. Now we are getting ready for Cursillo #99 and #100, a landmark time for us. We are all busy and computers are great, but there is no substitution for personal times of prayer and personal written messages to the new cursillistas and the team.

If you just have time to generate computer palanca, I personally think it's better to generate it than to have the new cursillistas go without anything. I would suggest, however, that a small investment of time by writing on the palanca that you are praying for them (and DO IT) and a personal signature can take some of the impersonal nature away.

As a reminder, or for information for new cursillistas, palanca should be separated between team and new cursillistas, in alphabetical order, men and women separate. Sponsors should not send up as palanca personal gifts but should give anything of that nature to their new cursillistas on the ride back down. The palanca people will not distribute gifts. You should not send up palanca and designate time and place of distribution. The palanca people are extremely busy and often don't have time for such special requests. It also has the danger of having those who don't receive special palanca wonder why they have been left out.

Remember, the best palanca is prayer for team, candidates, all on the road, and sponsors. Each weekend rides on prayer, and depends on prayer.
