### From the Chair

## From the Spiritual Director

*"See, I am making all things new" Revelation 21:5*

Recently I have become fascinated with the idea that the universe has a beginning and an end. This is now not just a theory, but a scientific fact with far-reaching implications. It means that material existence must not be the ultimate reality as atheists have claimed; the universe cannot come from nothing, nor can it just disappear into nothing. There has to be something prior to the universe from which it has come and something after it, into which it is absorbed. The idea that the universe is eternal and therefore the ultimate reality is no longer a valid idea.

We, as Christians, believe that God is the ultimate source of all that exists. God is what is eternal; his creation is a passing reality. The Judeo-Christian idea of creation is the world view that is compatible with the scientific facts.

We believe that God created the universe and that God will destroy the universe so that he can replace it with a new creation. We know this from Revelation, chapter 21, where St. John the Divine tells us that, ". . . I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away . . ." I find it interesting that if the universe is going to be destroyed and replaced, it means that everything will be destroyed and replaced. In fact, the mystery of the old being destroyed and replaced with the new is at the heart of Christianity. Jesus' earthly body was destroyed through the process of crucifixion and replaced with a resurrected body in the resurrection. God wants to get rid of that which is old and replace it with the new. He wants to destroy our sins and replace them with the righteousness of Christ. He wants to destroy the things in our lives that are robbing us of life, so that he can replace them with new life in Christ. Finally, he wants to destroy our bodies through death, so that our bodies can be replaced with new resurrected bodies.

A few weeks ago, many people made New Year's Resolutions, hoping that the new year would make things new in their lives. These resolutions are often just wishful thinking. In order to make things really new in our lives, we have to let go of something to

make room for what is new. The problem is that we do not have the power to let go of the old, to make room for the new. But fortunately, we believe in a God who can destroy the old and replace it with the new. It is the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection working through us that re-creates us into something new; Christ living in us is the power that makes us new.

I know in my own life, that I need to let go of certain things. For me, I need to lose 40 pounds of weight. I need to let go of many other things as well. But, it is when I yield myself to Christ and let him destroy the extra weight and other things that are holding me back, that I can be re-created into what God would prefer. A New Year's Resolution is not enough. It's when I let God destroy the things that I need to rid myself of that I encounter the Christ who says, "See, I am making all things new." And I do see.

I invite you to join me in this year of 2009 to live into the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection, the mystery of God who destroys and replaces all things. I hope that you will see Christ making something new in you. Amen. Happy New Year.
