From the Spiritual Director

Dear Friends,

An interesting fact about human beings is that we exist in both a material and non-material realms. The human body exists in the material realm and the human soul exists in a non-material realm.

Philosophers are always perplexed as to how a human can be both a material and non-material being at the same time and how the material part can connect with the non-material part. For example, how can a non-material idea in the mind cause the body to move? It is not my purpose here to answer this question, but simply to show that we are more than biological organisms.

Ancient Greek philosophers like Socrates and Plato believed that, once the body dies, the soul continues to live for eternity. They believed that the non-material part of human beings could not be destroyed and so, is immortal.

I have a question for Greek philosophy: Would a person want to live forever without a body? I sure wouldn't want to live that way. My body is a big part of who I am; existence without a body would be less of an existence that I now have on earth.

Christianity sharply differs from Greek philosophy; it believes that the soul can be destroyed because God has the power to bring things - all things - into existence and take them out of their existence. Christianity does not believe in the immortality of the soul. Instead, we believe that God can give us the gift of eternal life.

Christianity also differs in that we believe that God will save both the body and the soul of those who have true faith in Jesus Christ. In other words, we believe that God will save the whole person. Today, when I look at the various philosophies and religions of the world, it seems to me that the resurrection is an act of re-creation and is the most satisfying final state of existence. The resurrection means that God will bring all of me, body and soul, to perfection in His heavenly kingdom. As Karl Barth

He also sent his Holy Spirit to pour His risen presence into his faithful people, to guide us, to comfort us and to help us here on earth. He wants to bring all of you to perfection in His heavenly kingdom. Don't settle for anything less than resurrection.
